PSALMS THAT TEACH US HOW TO BATTLE

Psalm 18

I love You, O Lord, my God. The Lord is my refuge, my strength, and my deliverer. My God is my helper; in Him will I hope: my shield and the horn of my salvation, my defender. I call upon the Lord with songs of praise, and I shall be saved from my enemies...He reached from on high and took me; He drew me out of the deep waters. He delivered me from my strong enemies and from those who hated me, for they were mightier than I...He brought me forth into a spacious place; He will deliver me, because He delights in me...I will pursue my enemies and catch them, and I will not turn back till they are destroyed. I will crush them, and they will not be able to stand; they will fall under my feet. For You girded me with strength for war; You bound the feet of all my adversaries beneath me. You made my enemies turn their backs to me, and those who hated me You have utterly destroyed...You who deliver me from my angry enemies will exalt me above those who rise against me; You will deliver me from the unrighteous man.

Notice the "synergy" happening in the battle. The Lord gives strength, help, protection, and deliverance while I pursue and catch my enemies without turning back. We win together.

Psalm 27

The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the defender of my life; of whom shall I be afraid? When evildoers assailed me to eat up my flesh, my adversaries and foes, they stumbled and fell. Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war rise up against me, yet I will be confident of this. One thing have I asked of the Lord — that will I seek after — that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to behold the beauty of the Lord and to look upon His temple. For He hid me in His shelter in the day of my afflictions; He concealed me in the cover of His tabernacle; He set me high upon a rock. And now, behold, my head has been lifted up above my enemies...Instruct me in Your way, O Lord, and lead me on a right path because of my enemies...I believe I shall see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Wait on the Lord; be courageous and let your heart be strengthened; yes, wait on the Lord.

There are many surprising components to engaging the enemy. First, the primary focus is not on the enemy but on the Lord, His presence and beauty. There is confidence, not in my abilities, experience, or skills, but in God – the Lord is my light, salvation (the one who saves me), defender, shelter, leader, instructor, foundation, refuge, guide. There is also a vision of the end – the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living. Finally, there is a commitment to preparations/training – wait on the Lord.

Psalm 24

Lift up your gates, O you princes, and be lifted up, O everlasting doors, and the King of glory shall enter. Who is this King of glory? The Lord, strong and mighty, the Lord, mighty in battle. Lift up your gates, O you princes, and be lifted up, O everlasting doors, and the King of glory shall enter. Who is this King of glory? The Lord of hosts, He is the King of glory!

Understand the "gates and doors" as hearts open for the King of glory to enter. When you open up the gates and doors of your life, the strong and mighty Lord enters. There is victory only through union with the King of glory. The Lord of hosts, who is "mighty in battle," fights through us bringing glorious results.

Psalm 144

Blessed be the Lord my God, who trains my hands for war and my fingers for battle; my mercy and refuge, me helper and my deliverer, my protector in whom I have trusted, who subdues the peoples under me.

There is necessary physical training for battle within the real sphere of the Lord God's mercy, protection, help, deliverance and power. It is hard to train fingers and hands without training the whole body and mind. They do not act on their own but in coordination with my heart, soul, mind, and other parts of the body. All need to be trained.

Psalm 33

A king is not saved by his great army; a giant is not delivered by his great strength. The war horse is a vain hope for victory; despite its great might, it cannot save. Behold, the eyes of the Lord are on those who fear Him, on those who hope in His mercy, that He may deliver their soul from death, and keep them alive in famine. Our soul waits for the Lord; He is our helper and defender. Our hearts shall rejoice in Him, and we have hoped in His holy name. Let Your mercy, O Lord, be upon us, as we have set our hope on You

The Lord is my only hope for victory. Human and animal strength, whether in numbers or size, cannot be fully trusted. My role is to fear Him, hope in His mercy, wait for Him, rejoice in Him, fix my whole being on Him.

Psalm 35

Judge, O Lord, those who wrong me; fight against those who fight against me. Take hold of shield and buckler and rise for my help. Draw the sword and stop the way against those who persecute me. Say to my soul, "I am your salvation." Let those be put to shame and confounded who seek after my soul. Let those who desire evil for me be turned back and brought to dishonor. Let them be as dust before the wind, with the angel of the Lord afflicting them. Let their way be dark and slippery, with the angel of the Lord pursuing them.

Prayer is key to success in the battle. I need to continually cry out for God to act. If we keep reading, we see that this Psalm is a poetic prophecy about Christ's sufferings and death on the cross. From the opening verses, we get a glimpse of Jesus' own faith in His Father and His ability to deliver Him from His enemies. Jesus is the primary example of how to deal with our adversaries. In union with Him, we have what is needed to fend off their attacks.

Psalm 46

Come, behold the works of the Lord, what wonders He has wrought on the earth. He makes wars cease to the end of the earth; He will break the bow and shatter the spear and burn the shield with fire! Be still and know that I am God. I am exalted among the nations; I am exalted in the earth! The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our refuge.

With unreserved confidence in the Lord's ability to win any war, I can be still (vs. anxious, fearful, angry, or revengeful) and experience (participate in) His might.

Psalm 60/108

Will not You, O God, go forth with our armies? Oh, grant us help in times of tribulation, for vain is the help of man! With God we shall do valiantly; it is He who will bring our foes down to nothing.

This Psalm reminds us that we do not battle alone. God is with us. We can fight valiantly knowing that God the Almighty fights alongside us and through us.

Psalm 138

On the day I call upon You, hear me; in Your strength, You will multiply Your care for my soul...For the Lord is high, He regards the lowly; but the haughty He knows from afar. If I walk in the midst of trouble, You will give me life; You have stretched out Your hand against the wrath of my enemies, and Your right hand delivered me. O Lord, you will fulfill your purpose for me; Your mercy, O Lord, endures forever. Do not despise the works of Your hands.

Before going into battle, most ancient traditions engage in ceremonies calling out for the help of their god. The Warriors clearly know their own limitations. Warriors who follow the Triune God can humbly submit to His care as they aggressively combat all enemies. For example, they need not fear death since God gives them life, nor do they need to fear the outcome since God fulfills His purposes. We need to ceremonially or otherwise call out to God, who provides what we need to battle well.

Here's the basic marching order taken from these Psalms – Know God with your whole heart and body, for only in Him can you battle well. Pursue God, not victory.

Compatriot William Bozic attended the event and provided the following report and observations; he also took the photographs. This event has been held for several years and is often accompanied by living history displays and a reenactment. Thank you, William, for the report regarding this event.

I attended the 14th Annual Jefferson Civil War Symposium on August 2nd at the City of Jefferson's Convention Center in Jefferson, Texas, which is near the border with Louisiana and Arkansas. The Texas division's new president sat at my table, and there were plenty of Sons of Confederate Veterans as well as United Daughters of the Confederacy. There was plenty of coffee and homemade sweets, as well as amazing brisket from one of the top-rated brisket and barbecue places in the state of Texas. The event lasted from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and well over 100 people attended.



This talk covered some of the potential courses of action and hypothetical reasons. In some respects, the talk was similar to Ed Cotham's program because he allowed the audience to make decisions, given the information that would have been on hand at the time. Everyone was able to strategize what they would do. Seeing the troop positions on various pieces of ground led to the actual decisions made. Since I helped with this book, of course, my opinions will be somewhat prejudiced.



David Sesser gave a talk on food for the Union Army during the Camden Expedition, which coincided with the Red River Campaign in Louisiana in the spring of 1864. Both campaigns were spectacular victories for Confederate forces. David grew up in Arkansas but now teaches at Southeastern Louisiana University in Louisiana, where he serves as the director of The Sims Memorial Library and has access to numerous Confederate records. He used these records to detail how the depredations of Union troops committed on innocent civilians came back to haunt them, and ultimately caused their defeat. David Sesser told the unbiased truth and didn't sugarcoat anything, which was a joy to hear in these very woke times.



It was amazing to listen to the strategy and tactics, as well as some of the potential actions that never occurred. Listening to Ed was almost like a strategy session with a coach or general because he engaged the audience in the decision-making process, providing the pros and cons of various decisions as well as what happened. It can be said that no plan survives initial contact, which Ed keenly pointed out.

Compatriot and our Camp Adjutant had the honor of hoisting the Lone Star Greys Camp standard during the *Parade of Flags* ceremony at the 130th National Reunion in Houston this past July. Outstanding, Roy, you are looking every inch the descendant of proud Confederates and marching like a professional man-at-arms.



The Time has arrived to Lay Down the Bloody Shirt and Accept Heritage and History

Waving the "bloody shirt" at the South has been ongoing since the Army of Northern Virginia laid down its arms in April of 1865. Furthermore, cries of Southern bigotry and racism have been unceasing since the early 1960s, perhaps earlier, but became more virulent in the sixties, continuing through the present. Discussions about the War Between the States are no longer about the causes of the war but have been narrowed down to a single cause by northern self-styled elitists and pseudo-intellectuals. Have we learned nothing in the study of history? Helen's face alone did not launch a thousand ships, recalling the Iliad. As honest and level-headed historians know, and fewer may be willing to admit, that every war in recorded history was waged due to multiple

causes or grievances. Moreover, the unlearned, dishonest, or simply out of naïveté join in the cacophony of insisting that the South's bid for independence was waged by those of Anglo-Saxon descent. In the not-so-recent past, briefly during the late 1980s to mid-1990s, things began to change slightly insofar as anti-Southern bias, but as we know, that all too brief hiatus was short-lived, beginning in the middle of the first decade of the 21st century. All of a sudden, all things Southern, especially Confederate, were attacked with a vengeance that need not be dwelt upon in this writing.

With the change in the national political landscape following the 2024 national election, there has been a breath of fresh air that the choking of our history badly needed. It was more akin to being given life-saving oxygen for the preservation of our national and sectional history; it was about time. In 2017, the Texas Lonestar Greys Camp and Sanford Reed of the Hood's Texas Brigade Camp commenced the Los Tejanos Rebeldes Project to identify the final resting places of Tejano Confederate Veterans and catalog them for the sake of preserving history. In 2018, a ceremony honoring those Tejanos who wore Confederate gray at the San Antonio Confederate Cemetery, and in November of 2024, the Alamo City Guards Camps, after a determined effort, dedicated a statue of a Tejano Confederate soldier at the historic Ruiz-Herrera Cemetery in Bexar County. The Los Tejanos Rebeldes Project is continuing as additional names are added to the list, but the good news remains that the project has expanded.

We are now researching the names of various nationalities and ethnicities that served in the Lone Star State's Confederate units at the state and national levels. Veterans from various faiths, too, are being researched and catalogued. Thus far, the cataloging has yielded very positive results as hundreds of names have been listed from the greater San Antonio area, which includes adjacent and nearby counties. This is a labor of love and is a major blow to our detractors, who no doubt will be decidedly confused by the facts. It is incumbent upon our area Camps and other heritage and history preservation organizations to join us in this effort. Many of the area SCV members belong to a variety of history and heritage organizations, as well as ethnic oriented and Veterans organizations. We encourage you to enlist the support of these organizations in the effort. Tentatively, a ceremony or possibly ceremonies are being conceived to honor these men, which, by the way, will include men of Northern birth who served the Southern cause for independence.

Thus far, Germans, Austrians, French, Poles, Italians, Spanish, Portuguese, Cubans, Chinese, a Syrian, Norwegians, and Swedes, Swiss, Czechs, and Hungarians. Several dozen Northerners in service to the Confederacy, as well as several men of the Jewish faith, and of course, additional Tejanos, have been identified. Furthermore, many have impressive service records who returned home to pick up the pieces, making Texas once again a thriving, productive state following the oppression of the Reconstruction. This is a worthwhile project with one objective to honor these men and catalogue them for the sake of historical posterity, and secondly to dispel many falsities and unfounded assertions about those who fought for the Confederacy. Southern and Confederate heritage and history are a part of our national story and must be preserved.
