STEEPING INTO TEXAS HISTORY AT HONDO!

September 21st & 22nd was marked on our calendars as the SCV Hood's Texas Brigade, Camp #153, Medina Greys, Camp #2254, TSOCR, Inc. Alamo Rose #4 and the new South Texas Ladies History Association all banded together for the annual Medina Co. Fair in

Hondo, TX. Part of the opening festivities was the Medina Co. Parade which lead to the fair grounds. With all three organizations on the float we took to the streets of Hondo, playing southern music from the era and all showed our southern charms, we even had the cannon in two all decorated and got quite the turn out for the event.

At the fair grounds, the newly organized Hood's Texas Brigade Light Artillery, along with the Trans-Mississippi Old Guard made demonstrations and set up a living history camp along with members of the Medina Grey's Camp. The members of the TSOCR, Inc. Alamo Rose #4 and the new South Texas Ladies History Association set up a booth full of women's roles in the War Between the States, led by Mrs. Paula Perry and TSOCR Treasurer, Mrs. Jo Ann Seiler. With a de facto French government under Maximillian south of the Rio Grande, the Confederates hoped to establish trade between Texas and Mexico to obtain much needed supplies. The Lincoln administration, aware of Confederate intentions, sought to establish a military presence in Texas to discourage Mexican influence. A Union force in place near Beaumont, 30 miles inland from the mouth of the Sabine River, would cut the last railroad between Texas and the rest of the Confederacy and could possibly threaten Houston. At 6:00 am on the morning of September 8, 1863, a Union flotilla of four gunboats and seven troop transports steamed into Sabine Pass and up the Sabine River with the intention of reducing Fort Griffin outside of Sabine City and landing troops there. As the gunboats approached Fort Griffin, they came under accurate fire from the guns there. The fort's small force of 44 men, under command of Lt. Richard W. Dowling, disabled two ships, captured the gunboat Clifton with about 200 prisoners, and forced the Union flotilla to retire. The Confederate defenders suffered zero casualties and Union operations in the area ceased. The heroics at Fort Griffin - 44 men stopping a Union expedition - inspired other Confederates and became known as one of the most lopsided battles of the war.
