

Benjamin Beaird was born on I August 1840 in Bibb County, Alabama. His parents were Benjamin and Caroline McCullars Beaird. He moved to Texas in 1846 when he was six years old—first living in Shelby County before moving to Tyler, TX, in 1852, where he attended local public schools. When the war broke out in 1861, he soon enlisted in the 15th Texas Infantry, Company D, Polignac's Brigade, Walker's Division, Army of the Trans-Mississippi. He saw action in the defense of Texas at the battles of Mansfield, Pleasant Hill, and Yellow Bayou. He served as the Third Corporal of Company D and finally became the color bearer of the 15th Texas Infantry.

In 1875, he was admitted to the Bar Association, which led to a lifetime of service to Texas. He first served as a school trustee in Smith County. Later, he was elected and served as County Commissioner, County Judge (4 Terms), and Superintendent of Public Schools in Smith County from 1886 to 1894. He was elected as the State Representative of the 24th District (Smith, Upshur, and Camp Counites) in 1894, where he served two terms. He served as Chairman of the powerful Texas House Committee on County Government and Finances. He then served from 1911 to 1915 as the Mayor of the City of Tyler. He was President of the Smith County Fair Association from 1876 until 1909 when the old fairgrounds were sold to the Bergfield family, who eventually developed the property into the Bergfield shopping

center on Broadway Ave. A member of the International Order of the Odd Fellows and Marvin Methodist Church of Tyler, TX.

Following the war, on December 14, 1865, he married Mary Ann Adams, daughter of JJ Adams, a well-known farmer in Smith County, at Marvin Methodist Church in Tyler, TX. The Lord blessed them with ten children. He was a devoted family man, and among his children was Walter Beaird, who served as a Smith County Commissioner; Rufus Beaird, who was the first Pastor of the St. Paul Methodist Church; and Patrick Henry Beaird, who served as the Clerk of the District Court of Smith County. Many members of the Beaird family remain active in the Tyler community to this day.

In 1866, Benjamin established the Beaird farm. In 2000, the Texas Agriculture Department recognized the farm's historic significance of being run by the same family for over 130 years. He owned and edited "The Argent," a weekly newspaper published in Tyler, TX, and maintained an active law practice until he died in 1915.

January 15, 1915, on the day of his funeral, the Tyler Courier Times reported that every business in town closed for the memorial. Public schools were also closed, and his memorial drew a crowd known as one of the largest crowds ever assembled at Marvin Methodist Church. Benjamin and Mary Beaird are buried in historic Oakwood Cemetery, Tyler, TX.






### Raphael Semmes and the CSS Alabama

This book is one of my favorites, I have read it twice in the last couple of years! The book details the electrifying story of Captian Raphael Semmes and the famed CSS Alabama. The Alabama was a Confederate naval vesel that destroyed Union ocean shipping and took more prizes at sea than any other raider in naval history.

In July 1862, Semmes received orders to take command of a secret new British built steam warship, the Alabama. At it's helm, he would become the most hated and feared man in the yankee ports up and down the Union coast.





Stephen Fox does a masterful job of mixing both the story of the men who manned the Alabama, with just the right amount of detailed information as it relates to the ship's cutting edge technology and innovative design, which made the Alabama so fast and feared.

You get the vivid sense of the excitement and danger of the time, as Fox tells the story of the ship and crew's remarkable wartime exploits. From vicious naval battles off the coast of France, to plundering the cargo of Union ships in the Caribbean, this is a thrilling tale of an often overlooked chapter in the war of Northern Aggression.



### Texas Division Erects New Monument at Historic Oakwood Cemetery in Richmond, VA







November 15, 2024. Assisted by several members from the Virginia Division of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, we erected a replacement monument dedicated to Texas soldiers buried at historic Oakwood Cemetery in Richmond, Virginia. 



#### **How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?**

The SCV is the direct heir of the United Confederate Veterans. Organized at Richmond, Virginia in 1896, the SCV continues to serve as a historical, patriotic, and non-political organization dedicated to ensuring that a true history of the 1861-1865 period is preserved. Membership in the Sons of Confederate Veterans is open to all male descendants of any veteran who served honorably in the Confederate armed forces. Membership can be obtained through either lineal or collateral family lines and kinship to a veteran must be documented genealogically. The minimum age for full membership is 12, but there is no minimum for Cadet membership.
